2023 Jeffory and Sylvia Mander Memorial Lecture

Presented by Professor Keir Reeves with Bendigo Winegrowers Association

'After the Rushes: The Chinese role in regional Victoria communities and industries during the nineteenth century.'

Join Professor Keir Reeves as he gives a presentation which explores the Chinese communities throughout regional Victoria that continued long after the heyday of the gold rushes of the 1850s and 1860s.

Taking the audience on a visual historical tour of regional Victoria, Professor Reeves will discuss the role of the Chinese in the emergence of other industries following the rushes that continued well into the twentieth century and beyond. These included market gardening,

furniture trades, laundry industries, plantation agriculture, herbal medicine as well as a number of farming and agricultural activities including winemaking and viticulture.

Professor Reeves will particularly highlight the role of the Chinese in establishing the historic Victorian wine regions of Rutherglen, Great Western and the Pyrenees.

After the lecture, enjoy light refreshments with Rob Black from Black Estate Vineyard a member of the Bendigo Winegrowers Association. On offer and available to purchase by the glass will be a small selection of wines from the region showing the range and complexities of the local product. Meet Rob and learn more about the winemaker's craft as you discuss Professor Reeves' presentation.

Professor Keir Reeves is a co-director of the Future Regions Research Centre at Federation University Australia and is also a chair in history and heritage. Keir is from Castlemaine, was educated in Bendigo and currently lives just outside of Daylesford. His doctoral research project, undertaken at the University of Melbourne, explored the long-term legacies of the Chinese community in central Victoria during the second-half of the nineteenth century. His current research works at the intersections of heritage, cultural tourism, regional studies and history. Keir is a current member of the Public Records Advisory Council for PROV and also served two terms on the Heritage Council of Victoria.

Professor Reeves's publications include *Deeper Leads New Approaches to Victorian Goldfields History* (BHS Publishing, 2008). He also contributed to the Bruce Scates-led *Anzac Journeys: Walking the battlefields of the Second World War* (Cambridge University Press, 2013), that was shortlisted for the 2014 Australian Historical Association Ernest Scott Prize.
